Wildlife recording



Many of you may not know that our club secretary Peter runs a WhatsApp project to record the wildlife activities on the clubs waters. Peter sent me this update :

"Thanks all to those who have been sending their wildlife sightings to the WhatsApp group. To date we have recorded 76 species of birds along the club stretch, with a few waders added to the list this season. They included common sandpiper, curlew and sanderling, along with new records of Cetti's warbler, spotted flycatcher and peregrine falcon. Otters, mink and water shrew have also been spotted. There's always plenty of kingfisher action (a real favourite with resident and visiting anglers alike) and the swans and Canada geese seem to be recovering in numbers since the last bout of bird flu."

Regen Ben

The committee meeting in September was held at Townsend Farm thanks to a very kind invitation from Ben Taylor-Davies the owner of the farm. Ben who is better known as "Regenben" is a champion of regenerative farming. He is passionate about the subject and is an active educator on the subject to the farming community and industry. Ben is a straight talking man who practices what he preaches. Sadly, I could not attend but I had been lucky to spend an evening at the farm previously, thanks to a Friends of the Lower Wye event.

RoWAC Committee Visits Regen Ben – RoWAC Secretary Dr Peter Richardson

After years of raising awareness about the River Wye pollution scandal, the RoWAC committee are keen to pursue positive solutions. While we work with Fish Legal to push the authorities to take the action needed, there are exciting, on-the-ground initiatives being developed here in Ross to help clean up our beloved river.

At Townsend Farm, just upstream of Ross, Ben Taylor Davies works 224 hectares of land with 2.5 km running alongside the Wye. Regen Ben (regenben.com) was born from generations of West Midlands farmers and is now leading a local Regenerative Agriculture revolution. His vision is for a radical change in farming, where soil is properly valued, managed and regenerated to allow sustainable, viable and diverse agriculture with thriving farmland biodiversity. Key to this is keeping the soil and the nutrients on his land through strategic crop planting and land management, so the precious soil doesn't wash away into and contaminate the river.

Ben lectures and consults on Regenerative Agricultural in the UK and across the globe. One mid-September evening the RoWAC committee were lucky enough to catch busy Ben at home and enjoy one of his full-on farm tours. Ben is a force of nature. He walked us around his land for a couple of hours, explaining with energy and urgency their diverse crop and hedge planting regime for profit and water retention; innovative soil management to reduce phosphate pollution of the river; their automatic rotational and mobile chicken tractor (with rhea 'bodyguard') to reduce phosphate loading; the growing wagyu and other beef livestock; the rare-breed-sheep-grazed and future-proofing vineyard; mixed-flower planting plots and set-asides for wildlife and their farm honey bee hives, and his brand new fully-accessible sensory garden – just a few of the progressive ideas Ben and his family have initiated on the farm in recent years. Ben's infectious enthusiasm, knowledge and optimism were inspiring – if anyone can influence UK farming to be more sustainable Ben can. We all came away with hope in hearts.

As the tour ended in the dusk light, Ben's wife Helen warmly welcomed us to their family kitchen where we all enjoyed more chat with home-grown pork rolls, as well as beer from the farm brewery and some 2022 vintage wine from the vineyard – all absolutely delicious!

This includes the use of unhooking mats where appropriate, not keeping the fish out of the water unnecessarily and ensuring the fish has had chance to recover in the landing net before release."
