Members' work parties

Since the last newsletter we have completed two work parties. The first focused on the town stretch despite the best efforts of the weather resulting in prolonged flood water conditions.

We did make some good progress clearing away the winter/spring growth from many of the day ticket swims and a few on the member only side. The work completed opened up some swims that had got somewhat overgrown.

We switched our attention to Upper Benhall for the second work party session. We were very grateful to see a bigger turnout. As we had expected it had really suffered from swims getting overgrown, new willow growth being the biggest culprit. We were fortunate with the weather and pole saws were the order of the day. However, Wes brought some of the club's power tools along with the new first aid kits for which he gave a great H&S briefing before we headed off.

The Chub and Barbel Bash February 2024

A big thankyou to John Cheyne who as you know organised this fun members' event which went ahead thanks to the Wye being fishable after the poor weather. John has kindly sent in this report on the day's events:

"Back in February, we held our first ever Ross on Wye Angling Club Chub & Barbel Bash. This was a fun, friendly "match" with a difference. Instead of being pegged like most matches, the event was a roving match where the competitors could fish wherever they liked on our river stretches and fish caught were photographed on an unhooking mat next to a measure. The rules were simple: there would be two winners, the person who caught the longest barbel and the person who caught the longest chub.

Conditions looked pretty good first thing, and day ticket anglers could be seen landing some very decent barbel on the town stretch when we met up by Wilton Bridge to start the event. However, the river was rising quite fast, which would prove to make things tricky. With the club's shiny new fish measures handed out and once we had made sure everyone knew the rules, we all set off. Most people choose to fish fairly near to Wilton on the Lower Benhall stretch, but others headed for both Weirend and Upper Benhall. Those that headed off to quieter locations ended up glad of their decision!

Julian Lane got off to a flying start in the chub stakes, landing a fish of 53cm early on and then bagging another just 1cm longer almost immediately up at Weirend. While over at Upper Benhall, event organiser John Cheyne had a nice chub, only to discover he had forgotten to give himself a measure! The chub was released, and john had a long walk back to the car. Luckily for him his first cast on returning saw his rod tip fly round and a bronze flanked barbel of about 8lb graced the net which measured 72cm. The guys who had stayed around Wilton were now struggling for bites as the river rose. Our younger members then got in on the act as our chairman's sons Theo and Reuben found a fish or two, with Reuben landing a lovely barbel of 71cm. There were a few more chub caught through the match with most managing a fish or two and Julian managing to up his best to 55cm. Then as the match was coming to an end our Secretary Peter Richardson made a late surge for glory, netting two barbel in quick succession but both were just short of top spot at 71cm.

Back in the White Lion Pub we had a good chat about the days fishing over a pint and the final results were announced. Julian won the Chub prize (a very nice Korum Rucksack) for his 55cm fish with Stephan Williams 2nd with a 48cm chub. Event Organiser John Cheyne took top spot in the barbel stakes with his 72cm beauty, with the youngest competitor Reuben Leather a very close second on 71cm alongside Peter Richardson. Sportingly, John let Rueben pick up the prize and head off with the other Korum Rucksack commenting that it was fantastic to see one of our Junior members giving the more experienced anglers a run for their money!

All in all a great day, good fun and some lovely fish caught. It was particularly nice to spend some time together in the pub at the end and swap stories. We will be holding some more of these informal roving events in the future, so if you fancy meeting up with some other members and being part of one of these friendly events, please do get involved."

Bank safety

I thought twice about sharing this story with you as it involves me. This is a cautionary tale which does have a serious point. I was fishing at the upper end of Weir End quite near the big Oak tree close to the boundary fence a week or so before the coarse close season. The Wye was not in flood and had a nice steady flow. Before I started fishing, I took a good look at the swim which is on the inside of a bend. I like to do a risk assessment as it were and satisfy myself that it is a safe place to fish. I spent the day there quite happily blanking despite being convinced the conditions looked good for catching you will be delighted to know. My morale finally dipped around 4:20pm and I started to pack up. The next thing I knew the ground below my feet gave way completely with me going into the Wye. So, there I am alone in the river in the failing light wondering exactly how I am going to get out with a raised bank in front of me. I was aware that I was the only one at Weir End which made life that little bit more interesting. I was fortunate that I did after a few minutes managed to get myself back on dry land. I did how ever lose some gear that was in the section of bank that suddenly failed which I guess is just frustrating.

There are lessons to be learnt especially if you are like I was, fishing alone. One of the few good habits I have is letting my wife know exactly where I am fishing. I use What 3 Words to share my location. I urge you all to have a really good inspection of where you are going to fish and consider how you would get out of the river if the worst happened before you start fishing. Upon reflection, I could have done a lot better as I consider myself to have been very fortunate. Recognising that the bank was a little elevated, I really should have at least had a rope with me and secured it to a trunk and laid it out before I started fishing.

In a delicious coincidence the next time that I went out fishing the first two members I met had done exactly that and got a rope in place. They both had gone one step further and were wearing floatation aids and they were not fishing from an elevated swim. After sharing my dunking experience with them, I walked away super impressed with their attention to safety.

I did however get a bonus point from them when I showed them my crampon spikes that I bought to go over my wellies. I rate them as one of my best ever fishing buys which have stopped me from slipping or falling over during the muddy winter months many times. For under ten pounds form a well known South American river online store they make a huge difference.

Should I have failed to get out of the Wye, I would have been in the cold water for a long time before I had any chance of getting any help even though I was lucky that my phone still worked. That is another point that I need to think about as I sometimes fish on another club's water where I don't get any mobile service. So dear members I urge you to have a really good think about how you look after your safety when enjoying your fishing. My experience is one that I never want to repeat. I would very much welcome your thoughts and best of all suggestions on this topic.

The Wye monster mystery

On a much lighter note, we have a real mystery to solve. I witnessed this first hand when chatting to a member at Weir End when his rod bent round. Wonderful, he reported that it felt like a big one. After five minutes or so he almost got the fish to the net without us getting a good look at the beast. Just before victory was had the fish took off stripping line at a furious rate. The battle continued for another ten or so minutes. For a while he was able to hold the fish not gaining any line before it took off again stripping even more line heading off to what seemed like Lydbrook! Having stripped a mighty chunk of his line from the reel the inevitable happened and his line got caught in some branches. We tried in vain to free the line without success before the 12lb line snapped. We were left confused as to what on earth he had hooked that took such a large amount of line from the spool. Frankly, we have no idea at all, it did not feel like a barbel I am told. We wondered about it being a carp, even considering that somehow he had foul-hooked an otter.

The strange thing is that I have since heard of a very similar report from a member who was fishing our Benhall beat. Have any of you had a similar experience or any thoughts? Let me know, at this point it just remains one of those wonderful pub fishing tales.
