Watershed - a new film about our relationships with the mighty Wye

Our club secretary Peter Richardson has been instrumental in the making of a new film about the Wye. I have watched it myself and it is a very thought-provoking film. Here are some words from Peter about it:

"Our beloved River Wye holds a special place in our members' hearts, and of course, we are not alone. 'Watershed' is an engaging new film that combines breath-taking drone footage with heartfelt interviews to explore the many relationships with nation's favourite river' that are enjoyed, and suffered, by the local people who live with it.

The documentary was filmed and produced by RoWAC Secretary Peter Richardson and his wife Sue Ranger in 2023 when they worked for the Marine Conservation Society (MCS). Filmed between Chepstow and Ross on Wye, Watershed was first screened at public workshops held in those towns in January this year as part of a wider project to facilitate community input into local council initiatives to reduce negative impacts on the river.

The film features voices from along the Wye, including our own RoWAC Chairman Rob Leather, as well as several other familiar faces."

Pine Martens

Over the last few years my wife and I have been involved in the Forest of Dean Pine Marten reintroduction project. The project is just moving into its second phase as the successful initial project overseen by the Gloucester Wildlife Trust has finished. This project introduced a population of 35 Pine Martens into the forest from Scotland over a period starting in 2019. They are now well established and have successfully bred every year since.

The second phase is just starting under guidance from the Vincent Wildlife Trust. One of the great hopes of the project is that the Forest of Dean population will spread and connect with Pine Martens in other areas. There is already evidence that our Pine Martens have been very busy exploring well beyond their new home. A couple of examples being sightings in the Hereford area, and rather confusingly, a couple of males making the long trip around the Severn estuary through Gloucester and further down the south side of the estuary.

This is where I am asking for your help. I have to be honest the chances of you seeing a Pine Marten while you are out fishing are pretty low. However, should you see one please let me know. This is what the second phase is all about, monitoring movements, leaving the Pine Martens to do all the hard work for themselves. I am trying to think of what to offer as a bribe should one of you spot a Pine Marten and get in touch. Perhaps beer is the answer! As ever, the club is always keen to support conservation projects.
